MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

At the risk of repeating myself I would like to reiterate several elements of my last message. Leadership in our Ottawa-Carleton district is always difficult to find and that remains a priority. We need young retirees at the helm of the district. I therefore challenge young retirees to get involved in our organization to serve and care for their well-being and that of all retirees.

As the saying goes: "*You are never better served than by yourself*". We must remain vigilant to ensure that our defined benefit pension plan remains in place. Federal Bill C-27, which will open the door to a new type of pension, called target benefits pension plan, which is a threat to our own defined benefits pension plan. The implementation of the priorities we have put forward this year is well under way.

- In 2018, RTO/ERO will celebrate its 50th anniversary. A special committee has already started to work and has begun to develop projects to mark this important milestone for our organization.

Health Insurance after Age 65, more than Just Good Health Insurance, by Doug Carter

Are you a member of the RTO/ERO Extended Health Care Plan? Have you read your 2017 insurance booklet? It contains information on additional services available to you: Best Doctors, Eldercare Select and Venngo member perks are all programs that are available to you. Details are included in the booklet or online at <https://www.rto-ero.org/>

I recently met with a retired teacher who told me that she was going to cancel her RTO/ERO Extended Health Coverage because she had just become 65 years old and would now be covered by the Ontario Drug Benefit (ODB) in addition to her OHIP coverage. I advised her of the following information and she changed her mind.

The ODB Formulary (list of approved drugs) covers about 35% of all prescription drugs approved for prescription use by Health Canada. The RTO/ERO Extended Health Plan pays 80% of the drug cost, but not the dispensing fee, for prescription drugs. To contain costs the reimbursement is 80% of the cost of generic drugs unless your doctor recommends and the insurance company approves your need for the brand name drug.

If the member had cancelled her health insurance she would have lost coverage for the following:

-Paramedical practitioners such as physiotherapists, chiropractors, dieticians, eye glasses, etc....

-Aids such as hearing aids, CPAP machines, support stockings, etc.

-Travel insurance when out of the country or province for emergency medical care that does not cost more as you get older and covers trips of up to 93 days duration with no limit on the number of trips, trip cancellation and trip interruption insurance.

- If a person has medical needs while travelling outside the province OHIP limits payment to the amounts that would have been paid in Ontario. OHIP pays \$45 for an ambulance. Other provinces charge from \$240 to \$700. Air ambulances can cost from \$6 000 to over \$25 000. OHIP does not pay for ambulance or air ambulance costs outside of Ontario. OHIP will only pay \$400 per night if a person is hospitalized outside of the country/province.

Complete details of the coverage provided by our RTO/ERO plan is contained in the insurance booklet that every member received last winter.

Political Advocacy Committee (PAC)

What the provincial PAC is doing on your behalf:

a- Elder Abuse Ontario: We, RTO/ERO, have established a partnership and made a donation to the provincial organization.

b- Bill C-27: Work has begun on refuting Bill C27, an Act to amend the long-standing Pension Benefits Standards Act, 1985. For more info contact: regimbal.roger@sympatico.ca

c- Checklist for Age-Friendly Communities: An Age-Friendly checklist generated by Alberta Health is now available; it incorporates the original *Checklist of Essential Features of Age-Friendly Cities* developed by the World Health Organization (WHO) and *Age-Friendly Rural and Remote Communities: A Guide* developed by the Federal/Provincial/Territorial Ministers Responsible for Seniors. d- Levels of Care - Personal Support Workers: The Committee received information that there are no regulations for staffing in long-term care in Ontario, regarding the level of care in long-term facilities. The Committee will keep a watch on this issue, as it fits with the Patients First focus.

e- Others Issues: Members of (PAC) continue to research and monitor a variety of issues which could impact upon RTO/ERO members and their families. The primary issues are: a) Elder Abuse Ontario; b) Canadian Medical Association; c) CCAC; d) Auto Insurance.

f- Hydro rates: This will be a key issue in the upcoming 2018 provincial elections and will be continuously monitored. Other issues, including the right to die and personal support worker to

patient levels of care, in long term care facilities, have been brought forward to the Committee by RTO/ERO member. On the issue of Pharmacare. A meeting was held with the Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Health, John Fraser. To be followed!
